WORKSHOP REPORTS

The Society workshops held in September and October were "non-internet" days to highlight that everything is not on the internet. The success of these days has led to the planning of more similar workshops next year.

In **September** we looked at the Archives Resource Kit (ARK) from NSW State records and local newspaper microfilms. Some members had "V number" data so that was a starting point.

- 1. V 18501049 67 means 1850 (year) 1049 (Item number) 67 (Volume)
- 2. How to find the microfilm reel by using ARK Index or in reel cabinet
- 3. How to cut and print or save to usb

The next topic was ARK Archives in Brief following the flowcharts.

Finally we used the NSW microfiche with births up to 1918

The **October** workshop concentrated on Society resources using firstly the printed Resource Directory then the "non internet XP computer" to find resources. We looked at books and CDs which can only be accessed on the Society desktop computer. The Cemetery CDs proved very popular, as did some of the District History books.

GRAEME'S DNA WORKSHOPS

In 2012 when I was still newly researching my family tree, I discovered that I had a Black Convict ancestor.

In an effort to find out more about her origins I investigated DNA which would have passed from her to me.

I chose www.FTDNA.com as it offers more future testing choices than Ancestry & was cheaper.

If you go to www.ftdna.com then click on Family Finder then under the [Add to cart] are a few links to OVERVIEW DISCOVER YOUR ORIGINS FAMILY MATCHES FAQ which will explain the purpose of each test.

Family Finder has proved to be the most valuable for people just looking for their racial origins & then related people of either sex. It is also the cheapest test at about AUS \$120 for test & postage of sampler to you & back. The sampler is a small "toothbrush" that you scrape inside your cheek. This sample is kept by them forever & you can ask for more tests as needed. I asked for each test separately as questions arose. It did not always help but as more people do it I still have hope. ©

In 2016 quite a few members of the MWFHS have recently had their Family Finder done & I was happy to share my experience over the last 3 years.

My Racial origins came out:

31% Scandinavian which merely indicates that many of my ancestors came from Yorkshire & Scotland 28% Western European which indicates that many of my London ancestors were the descendants of European immigrants.

26% English which indicates that I did have some ancestors from Cornwall, Somerset, Wales & Ireland plus a "Native English" part in all those others.

12% Southern European indicates that southern English ports & London are the first port of call for ships from the south. (Portugal, Spain & Italy)

None of these results mean that I would be able to find exotic ancestors within historical time.

Only a tiny amount of the black convict were still present as she was my gggggrandmother born in 1789.

My Family Finder matches of people who do share my DNA only shows a few people with very small amounts of DNA in common. They are all 4th cousins so we share a ggggrandparent.

I immediately tried to contact the 2 closest matches without success. It was 12 months before someone else out of my matches contacted me. Since then 2 other individuals & a family group have made contact.

The benefit I have derived from this is that much of my tree was originally guesswork as I have very few fellow family researchers. By these people sharing DNA & sharing ancestors meant my assumptions have been confirmed.

DNA passes from parents to children as a random mix to each child, so just because you don't share DNA with someone does not mean you are not related. It is just chance. So NO match does not mean unrelated but YES match does definitely mean you are.

Relationship	Match Probability
2 nd cousins or closer	> 99%
3 rd cousin	> 90%
4 th cousin	> 50%
5 th cousin	> 10%
6 th cousin and more distant	Remote (typically less than 2%)

I have found these tests very interesting.

COUSIN TERMS AND DEFINITIONS:

FIRST COUSIN

Your first cousin is a child of your aunt or uncle. You share **one set of grandparents with your first cousin, but you do not have the same parents.**

SECOND COUSIN

Your second cousin is the grandchild of your great-aunt or great-uncle. You share one set of great-grandparents with your second cousin, but you do not have the same grandparents.

THIRD, FOURTH, AND FIFTH COUSINS

Your third cousin is the great-grandchild of your great-great-aunt or great-great-uncle. You share a set of great-great-grandparents with your third cousin, but do not have the same great-grandparents. Fourth cousins have one set of great-great-grandparents, but not the same great-great-grandparents. And so on.

DOUBLE COUSINS

If two siblings in one family marry two siblings from another family and each couple has a child, the children are double first cousins. **The word** *double* **in addition to the first cousin term is because they share the same four grandparents**. Regular first cousins share only one set of common grandparents, while double first cousins share both sets of grandparents plus all lineal and collateral relatives.

REMOVED

The relationships of **cousins of different generations are explained by using the word "removed".** Cousins who are "once removed" have a one-generation difference. For example, the first cousin of your father is your first cousin, once removed. In that case, your father's first cousin is one generation younger than your grandparents and you are two generations younger than your grandparents. This one-generation difference is explained by saying that you are cousins "once removed."

Twice removed means that there is a two-generation difference between cousins. If you are two generations younger than the first cousin of your grandparent, then the relationship between you and your grandparent's first cousin are first cousins, twice removed.

Cousin relationships can be any combination of first, second, third and so on, with once removed, twice removed, and so on.

GENERAL REGISTER OFFICE LAUNCH OF NEW INDEXES

The General Register Office has launched new online indexes of births and deaths for England & Wales which provides additional information and makes ordering of certificates easier.

The key features of the new indexes are:

- The GRO have based the indexes on transcriptions of their registers made during the aborted DoVE (Digitisation of Vital Events project). This means that errors and omissions made in the construction of the original indexes, or when handwritten indexes were recast as typeset indexes, are likely to have been avoided.
- The new indexes include births from 1837 to 1915 (ie more than 100 years old), and deaths from 1837 to 1957.

Extra information:

- The mother's maiden name is now shown from 1837 onwards, which also helps us to identify illegitimate births.
- The age at death is now shown from 1837 onward.

The existing indexes will continue to be available online at the usual sites. To view the GRO indexes you'll need to log-in at their site, and you may be required to verify your email address. (Source – Lost Cousins newsletter)

BURIAL RECORDS AND UNMARKED GRAVES:

Manning Wallamba Family History Society Inc. has an ongoing project to record graves on private property and unmarked graves in all local cemeteries.

The upgrading and recording of burials has shown the Society just how many unmarked and unknown graves and burial sites there are in the area.

The deterioration of grave markings is also of concern (as shown in the examples below from Dawson River Cemetery). To ensure that the Manning Wallamba Family History Society Inc.
