A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

Our 25th Anniversary Year is well under way and hasn't the time flown! One of our members was delighted to learn of his direct connection to one of these women and the mention of her name in the film!

Edie as she was commonly known was born the first child of 12 children of William Henry Green, commonly known as Harry and Isabella (Mills) Green of Knorrit Flat-Tiri in the Upper Manning, West of Wingham.

Bill and Edie dairied and grew millet for broom making. Edie took on hard work on the farm as soon as the older girls were able to take control of the household and tend to the younger children. It was not unusual to find Edie repairing roads on the property which was known as "Wenonah." Edie maintained an attractive garden on the property together with a clay tennis court, the venue for many social tennis games and district competitions, between local farming community members. The old home has since been demolished.

As years passed and the family matured and left home (Betty and May became schoolteachers), Bill and Eadie moved to Church Street Harrington where a house was built on Pilot Hill.

Here they retired and joined the local community, Bill spending much time fishing and bowling. He was a foundation member of the Harrington Bowling Club. Edie was active in her garden, raising fowls and breeding Fox Terrier dogs. She attended most dances in the village hall with her close friend Florence Muir, a near neighbour.

Harrington, being a popular holiday and fishing village, meant that they were never short of visitors for holidays.

The writer, a Grandson, spent many a school holiday at Harrington and has fond memories of those past days, particularly before the advent of electricity when the old "Tilly" lamp had to be pumped up, to hiss along during the night.

Edie recalled nights prawning in the "corner" during the run out tide in the "dark" where a scoop would be set in a race among the rocks to catch prawns leaving the backwater for the ocean. Prawns would swim down the race with the run out tide and become trapped. On one such occasion a local male identity became a little too friendly and she had to warn him off with the gaff she carried to remove any octopus which entered her prawn scoop!

She told of fears of a Japanese landing during the war years and of strange marks appearing on the beach overnight, perhaps indicating that they may have come ashore investigating or seeking water.

Their youngest child Rosemary accompanied them to Harrington for some time and at age 18 and whilst visiting her eldest Sister Hazel at Bulli, was tragically killed in a car accident on 18th August 1947. Edie never really recovered from the shock of this death.

Edie was seldom idle. If not in her garden she would be in the kitchen or making beautiful poker work woollen floor rugs. I remember one featuring a large tiger.

Edie and Bill were always supportive of the "underdog" and allowed Gordon Scott a former Harrington milkman and identity to reside in a small cabin at the rear of their block. Gordon later moved on to become caretaker of the camping reserve where his residence was the former gaol in which notorious Jimmy Governor was held at Wingham. This was later removed to Wingham Museum where it is a feature to this day.

Bill and Edie's health gradually deteriorated with Bill passing away 30th March 1960.

Edie spent her declining years with daughters across the State, basing herself mainly with daughter Hazel at Yanco near Leeton.

Edie passed away 1st July 1964 at Taree and was interred beside Bill at Tinonee Cemetery.

She was indeed a remarkable woman!

Reflections over 25 years as a member of The Manning Wallamba Family History Soc. Inc. Barbara Waters Member No.160

My interest in family history started with a very old death certificate of my great great grandfather David Irvine of Dingo Creek. I discovered he had been married three times, I only knew of his second marriage to Isabella Agnew, I began to ask questions and met with reluctance to answer them.

I attended the first meeting to form The Manning Wallamba Family History Society at Ormsby House in 1985. Meetings were later held at Manning Gardens School .I joined the society to help me with my own research.

The Late Mick Constable was the first president of the Society.

I remember the first Christmas party held in a member's back yard- this knowledgeable man talking of Scottish immigration in the Hunter and Manning Valleys.

Workshops were held in members homes and a lot of laughs re "skeletons on the cupboard" and of course Convicts, these were now fashionable to have on the family tree.

Resources were limited to a few fiche, reference books and the odd microfilm. Trips to use the IGI were taken to a private library at Port Macquarie. If more information was required you wrote to the Genealogical Service Centre at Carlingford enclosing one American Dollar noting the Batch Number. .A NSW certificate then cost \$10 without the index Number and \$8 with the Index Number.

The Genealogical Research Directory and Nick Vine Halls book "Tracing your Family History" were great tools.

Lots of letters written enclosing International Reply Paid coupons with the hope you would receive a reply. The late Nick Vine Hall's column in the "Land " newspaper "You Found Who In Your Family Tree" was another source of information; later journals from other societies and our own "Fig Tree" contained interesting information.

Trips to Sydney to the State Library, Archives and Society of Genealogists were eye openers, I remember at The Archives the Archivist apologised that the records I was looking for had not been microfilmed I was able to handle (with white gloves on) the original documents of land purchases of my family and letters written to the Colonial Secretary by Major Innes from the early days of Port Macquarie.

Family Historians continue to share information. We now have a Heritage Section in our library not a briefcase or a cupboard of earlier years. My family laughed when I was rostered on "Cupboard Duty" today. We have microfilm for so many records, computers with the world wide web information a mouse click away and lap tops to use wherever we go but we still have to double check our information for accuracy.

I have been fortunate to meet many of my extended family that I would never have met without my interest in family history and share our stories.

<u>Memories of my First Years as a Member of the Manning Wallamba Family History Society,</u> by Sue Robinson. Member No 127

I first heard that a group was forming in Taree to work on their family histories during 1985. We had just moved back to the area and my grandparents were giving me information about our family and urging me to find out more

So, not knowing what I was letting myself in for, I signed up as one of the first members of the Manning Wallamba Family History Society in late 1985.

Our first newsletter, "The Fig Tree" was produced in April 1986, after much deliberation about the name. A couple of alternative suggestions were "The Man-u-Wall" and "The Meander Wall". Meetings were held at the Manning Gardens Public School in the evenings and the committee consisted of Mick Constable, Lyn McMartin and Kaye Skinner. The first local cemeteries were being transcribed under the leadership of Marilyn Easter (Gill). I can remember meeting with Lyn and the others at one of the cemeteries with my thermos and biccies, sun hat and lots of enthusiasm.

In September 1986 the venue for our meetings was moved to the GTCC Library premises and we even had our own research and archival cupboard, (1 only!!) at the library. We had the use of a fiche reader and were investigating the purchase of a film reader.

In those early days of the society we had to travel a lot to find research facilities. Places we went to were Newcastle and Sydney and also to a venue in Port Macquarie where we could look at convict indents on fiche. I'll never forget my excitement on finding the indent of my "first convict" Henry Deards. The information was vivid and very descriptive, telling me he had lots of scars and also a grand total of 16 tattoos over his body, including hearts, men with guns, hares and foxes, man on horseback and a woman on the inside calf of his left leg! The trip that day was really worthwhile and all our trips were good fun. We usually made a couple of car pools for the day with everyone chipping in.

It was great as well to listen to our visiting speakers. Janet Reakes was one of our most popular guests. She always had interesting information for both experienced researchers as well as raw beginners.

In 1987 the committee consisted of Tony Holland, Anne Calvert, Tina Smithers, Margaret Hooper and Marilyn Easter, (Gill). Our reference material and micro fiche and film collections were becoming quite extensive. We had two cupboards!! We raised money by holding street stalls, lamington drives and also bus trips to places like the Newcastle Library. Members were on duty in the GTCC library for a couple of hours on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

In 1988 at the AGM, President Tony Holland extended our appreciation to the GTCC Library staff for their cooperation with our group in many areas and for the valuable use of their premises for our research facilities. Lots of things have changed since our group's beginnings, but many things remain the same. The hard work and dedication of members over the last 25 years has maintained the success of our group as a society. We continue to have fun while working on the serious and contagious business of genealogy, and we continue to have a mutually beneficial relationship with the GTCC and the library staff. Let's hope the good work and fun continues for another 25 years!!
