

FINDING EARLY NSW RECORDS:

The Society has some valuable resources with references to early NSW residents. The majority of these have been sourced from the NSW State Records. Some are copies of actual records or books while others are indexes of records held at the Western Sydney Records (Kingwood). Look at the CD cover or NSW Records website for further details (<u>www.records.nsw.gov.au</u>) of availability and publishers.

Numbers shown (eg LD008) are Society Accession Numbers

OLD REGISTERS 1-9 PEO 351

The Old Registers are a collection of documents where everyday legal transactions were recorded from 1794- the earliest days of the Colony of New South Wales. They are officially known as the Registers of Assignments and Other Legal Instruments.

The nine registers represent a unique social record of the period from 22 January 1794 to 15 May 1824. The documents are an extremely rare and a valuable record of the early colonial settlement of New South Wales. The register was the first place that people of the new colony were able to officially record their legal transactions.

The Old Registers contain

- land transactions
- · domestic legal matters such as affidavits, bills of sale and bonds
- · whaling and shipping agreements
- · a variety of deeds
- · letters of power of attorney
- · listing of names of early colonists
- place names within Sydney and the colony.

INDEX TO THE COLONIAL SECRETARY'S PAPERS 1788-1825 PEO 118

The Papers include:

- petitions by convicts for mitigation of their sentences;
- requests for permission to marry;
- memorials attesting to the worthy character of potential settlers;

- applications for land grants or leases;
- reports on official visits;
- information about court cases and lists of assigned servants
- anything to do with the colonial administration of the day.

FIRST TITLE HOLDERS OF LAND LD 006

in the Parishes of Camden, Cook, Hunter, Durham & Gloucester. Prepared by Cooff Cannon

The data for the lists is taken from parish maps purchased from the Department of Land Sydney. In addition to the lists of titleholders to private land, supplementary lists have been compiled containing, Churches, Schools, Cemeteries, Historical Features, Registered Grants, Recreation Grounds and Public Parks and Reserves dated pre 1900.

YEWEN'S DIRECTORY OF THE LANDHOLDERS OF NSW 1900 (Archives CD Books) LD 008

This was the "first broad attempt at publishing a complete directory of landowners in New South Wales. The directory is divided into approximately 1900 postal localities grouped under 87 larger districts. There is an introduction and summary to each district.

It indicates for each landholder whether they are dairy farmers, graziers or agriculturalists and what crops are under cultivation in the following categories - wheat, maize, barley, oats, potatoes, tobacco, sugar, other crops, grapes and orchard fruits.

PASTORAL POSSESSIONS NSW

William Hanson 1889 (archives CD Books)

William Hanson: The Pastoral Possessions of New South Wales Printed 1889

The volume is alphabetically arranged within each of the Eastern, Central and Western Divisions, with the names of the pastoral holders of the Crown, the Land District and County in which each holding is situated, the area in acres, the annual rent and licence fee, the rate per acre and per section for each leasehold and resumed area respectively.

Part I Eastern Division pp. 1-165

Part II Central Division pp. 169-397

Part III Western Division pp. 401-507

Index to Numbers and Names of Holdings pp. 509-520.

NSW CROWN LANDS LEASE CLAIMS 1848 LD 024

The New South Wales Government Gazette published lists of "persons [who] have demanded Leases of the several Runs of Crown Land, particularised in connexion with their respective names". These lists have been extracted from the Government Gazette and published here. They were published between May and October 1848. In addition there is a list of "Crown Lands Claims Approved within the Settled Districts"

REGISTERS OF AURIFEROUS (GOLD) LEASES, 1874-1928

Gold leases for most NSW Districts. LD 009–023

The index records name of the lease holder, lease number, date of application, location, remarks, series number, reel/item number, and surveyor's name. It should be noted that in certain cases the registers do not show any further information than recorded in the index.

ARCHIVES RESOURCE KIT (ARK)

The ARK was a result of NSW *Access for All* initiative to provide people in regional and rural NSW with better access to the State's archives. The Kit contains over 1565 items (962 fiche and 604 reels) of our most popular and heavily used colonial records.

The ARK builds on a genealogical research kit issued in the 1980s and already held by some of the community access points. It includes explanatory material and links to information available on our website. Topics covered include births, deaths and marriages; shipping; convicts; professions and occupations; land; naturalization; orphans; records of the Colonial Secretary; and more.

The ARK (or parts of it) are held at Taree Library.
